

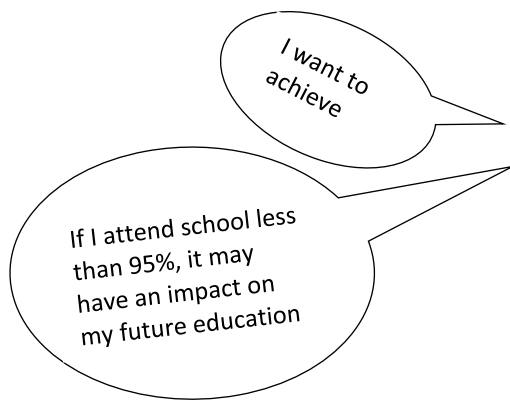
Attendance

At Blackwell Primary School, we constantly strive and look for ways to improve the education for all our children. **Next academic year, we need to ensure attendance continues to improve for all children.** We will be looking at the overall attendance of all of our children and monitoring attendance of individual children when it nears 95% and when punctuality becomes cause for concern. We have an Education Welfare Officer (EWO) who works with our families to ensure that every school-aged child is receiving a suitable, full-time education by encouraging regular attendance at school, to raise the attendance of our pupils. Our Attendance policy ensures that we are following all legal requirements and is available to parents and carers on the school website. We strive to achieve 97% or above attendance across the school.

What do I do if my child is ill?

Of course, children are ill on occasions and, when this is the case, we readily accept that being at home is the best place to be.

Children cannot help being ill and as a school we want all our children to be well and healthy and able to learn happily and confidently when they are here. However, the traffic light system, shown below, is a very useful guide to help you to decide when to send your child to school and when to keep them at home.

HOLIDAYS IN TERM TIME

As a school, we do not authorise holidays in term time, and fixed penalty notices are issued.

If your child does require authorised time, due to exceptional circumstances, you need to complete and return the appropriate form, which is available from the office.

If your child is too unwell to attend school...

- ✓ Please notify the school via Studybugs, or phone the school on 01342 323906, press 1 to report an absence, and leave a message stating: your child's name, class and reason for absence.
- ✓ If we have no contact from you by 9.30am, we will phone to ascertain your child's whereabouts and reason for absence.
- ✓ You are required to phone the school on each day of continued absence, unless we have had prior notice.



RED STAY AT HOME

Raised temperature (of over 37.5°)

Rashes can be the first sign of many infectious illnesses such as chickenpox and measles. If your child has a rash, check with your GP before sending them to school.

Vomiting and diarrhoea: Children with these conditions can return to school 48 hours after their symptoms have settled.

AMBER TAKE ADVICE

Headaches: A child with a minor headache does not usually need to be kept off school.

If the headache is more severe or is accompanied by other symptoms such as raised temperature or drowsiness, then keep your child at home and consult your GP.
